
Here is a picture of Stan mentoring at a RYLA gathering at Camp Clayton in Ulverstone

Menzies Inc developed from the 'Ragged School Mission' founded in inner-city Melbourne in 1865, which provided residential care to children from 1895. In the early 1900s, the Mission moved to Frankston and became known as the Minton Boys' Home – after William Minton, who for many years provided food, care and shelter to children living on the city's streets. Later, the organisation underwent another name change and became The Menzies Home for Boys. The name honoured Mr James Menzies (the father of former Prime Minister Sir Robert Menzies), who was President of the Committee of Management for 20 years during a crucial period in the organisation's development.

Until the sixties, Menzies was known for its 'Home on the Hill' – a large property on Oliver's Hill in Frankston that housed all the children. As research on children's care developed, large group housing was no longer seen as best practice. The Home on the Hill was sold in 1965, and a series of family group homes was established in Frankston and throughout the Mornington Peninsula.

Menzies: Caring for Kids is now an organisation dedicated to supporting young people in Frankston and on the Mornington Peninsula. Over its 150 year history it has evolved many times to fulfil the needs of the community. Menzies progressed through a significant period of change in 2014/15 where we moved from our former role as a residential care service provider to a new focus on philanthropy, service and program support.

Menzies core mission remains the same – to support young people who can no longer live with their families to be safe, educated and lead fulfilling lives. Rather than providing housing we will invest in direct programs that create more opportunities for some of the most disadvantaged young people in our local communities. Menzies: Caring for Kids is highly regarded in the region and is fully committed to the next phase of its development.

Lighthouse Foundation

Last Tuesday we heard about the plight of young homeless. On any given night there are 42,000 young people with nowhere to sleep, except on the street. The ages of the people vary but here we are talking under 18 year olds.

Lighthouse Foundation's vision is to end youth homelessness, together. They do this by supporting homeless young people to take their rightful place in the community. They provide them not just with a home, but with a family and a therapeutic model of care that is individually tailored and proven to work. Through their Lighthouse experience, young people can heal, learn again to relate to others and start to rebuild their lives.

Each suburban Lighthouse home accommodates up to four young people who are supported by two live-in carers and a dedicated team of psychologists and health professionals. Young people are welcome to stay with Lighthouse for as long as they need and may continue to access support through their outreach programs after they transition into independent living.

Susan Barton AM, founder of the Lighthouse Foundation and 2009's Melburnian of the Year is a woman whose passion and inspiration has been the driving force of Lighthouse.

She began her work with homeless young people over three decades ago. After working in an orphanage overseas this experience changed her life. On her return to Australia, Susan, now a mother of six herself, began fostering children in her own home and thus developed the unique model of Lighthouse family care.

In 1991, with support from the business community, Lighthouse Foundation was officially formed to support and expand this work, and to eventually fulfil her vision of Lighthouses being open for young people in danger of homelessness.

Over two decades later Lighthouse is flourishing and they need our support.

Pantry 5000

Pantry 5000 provides food relief and support for people who are in need. We also provide a place where people can be accepted and loved. Support is provided to people on Health Care Cards, Pensions and those who have been referred from other welfare agencies.

Pantry 5000 started in March 2012, in response to our 40 Days of Community program, with an initial 15 guests. In February this year we registered our 500th guest. Over 75% of our guests are from the local Seaford to Mordialloc area, with the rest coming from adjacent areas.

Since Christmas we have had an average of about 120 guests each week. This has been an increase of over 30% from the end of last year. With the changes in social welfare we are finding the need for support growing markedly.


