WORLD OF DIFFERENCE PROJECT

Hi Ian,

Could you include in our next WW the following sent to me by Rob Hines from World of Difference. The International Committee Has allocated a sum of \$1500 per year to be used to fund a Teachers Salary & Class room supplies for the next 4 years at a new Primary school at Bosala in Kampon Spue Provence Cambodia.

Any suggestions from the Members on how the surplus of \$300 should be spent are welcome. Personally I would like to see it go towards Uniforms, Books & Exercise books. The photos show the new school & one of the 5 classrooms. The school was totally funded by World of Difference with the help of some very generous people in Melbourne.

Hi Greg,

Thank you very much for the donation of \$1500 for our World of Difference Project.

I have attached a couple of photos of the school and the children.

We have allocated most of your donation to the sponsorship of 1 teacher at the school. There are 6 teachers and we pay \$80USD/Month in salary for each of them. At this stage we don't have enough sponsorship to pay for all 6 teachers so we are pooling the funds and adding to the pool from our own resources.

\$80USD/month is equivalent to about \$1200 AUD so we have another \$300 from your funds that can be allocated in a number of ways. We'd be pleased for you to nominate how you would like that \$300 spent. The options are:

School uniforms - \$5 each Books - \$3 each Exercise books - 10cents each Biology garden (new project this year) \$450

or it can just be allocated into the teacher salary pool.

Please let me know.

FOOD SHORTAGES

EACH month more than 140,000 Victorians struggle to put meals on the table and they seek help from suburban food charities.

But charities do not have enough food to go around.

About 6680 of those seeking help – almost 2000 of them children – are turned away each month as the charities struggle to keep up with growing demand, Foodbank's 2016 Hunger Report reveals.

The Feed Melbourne Appeal strives to fix this problem.

The appeal, founded by Leader Community News and food charity FareShare, raises money each year to help charities boost their capacity and collect more food to help people in need. Now in its ninth year, the appeal has raised more than \$3.2 million for 147 Victorian food charities.

Grants of up to \$15,000 to the charities have been used to buy freezers, fridges, insulated vans, storage and cooking equipment to help them make the most of rescued surplus food, but the struggle continues.

FareShare chief executive Marcus Godinho said while his organisation was rescuing a growing amount of food, it was not enough.

"This year local charities will have an option to apply for food, as well as grants for equipment," Mr Godinho said. "We are working with PFD Food Services to source food in bulk at the lowest possible prices for local charities." This year, Newman's Own Foundation, started by late Hollywood star Paul Newman, is supporting the appeal with a contribution of \$US200,000. Foundation chief executive and president Robert Forrester said the organisation was passionate about helping disadvantaged people, and promoting nutrition.

"If you are not dealing with food security, the other issues of education and good health simply won't follow, so that's a priority of ours," Mr Forrester said. "When we came and visited FareShare the first time we were really taken by how efficient the program is, by how driven it is by providing a great service but also having great imagination.

"So when the opportunity arose to get behind Feed Melbourne, we just thought that was a great way for us to help."

The foundation has contributed more than \$US485 million to global not-forprofit groups.

Woolworths is also on board with the appeal this year. Until May 28 customers will be invited to add a \$2 Feed Melbourne raffle ticket to their shopping, with \$20,000 worth of Woolworths groceries to be won. "Many Victorian communities have a Woolworths supermarket, and this provides us with a fantastic opportunity to raise awareness and funding for important community matters, such as the work of FareShare," Woolworths general manager operations for Victoria and Tasmania Andrew Hall said. You can also get involved by hosting a Shout Lunch day at work, asking your colleagues to bring in leftovers or homemade food and requesting they donate a day's lunch money.

Students from schools such as Glen Huntly Primary School (pictured on the front page), can also take part by running a rice and pasta drive – with all food collected picked up by FareShare and used in its Abbotsford kitchen or delivered to community meal programs.

Every dollar donated to the appeal goes to food charities including FareShare, which receives a third of contributions.
